# **Listening Lesson Plan**

### **Objective:**

Students will be able to distinguish between a major and a minor chord, presented both written and aurally.

## **Pre-Requisite Material:**

Students will need to have studied:

- Note Names
- Scales
- Intervals

# **Lesson Plan Procedure:**

#### Review:

- 1) Both major and minor scales (audible and written)
- 2) Intervals using <a href="https://www.musictheory.net">www.musictheory.net</a> (use the interval trainer)
- Play examples from the computer and have students answer aurally.
- 3) Introduction to major and minor chords
- Give audible demonstration on piano of differences between major and minor sounds.
- Have students participate by answering aurally.
- Using the textbook *Tonal Harmony*, (Kostka & Payne) discuss pp. 41-43 on the structure of major and minor chords.
- 4) Students will answer the 5 Checkpoint questions at the end of 3-1 and have them grade each other's paper.
- 5) Give homework assignment out of *Practice of Harmony* (Spencer).
- 6) Use musical examples from <a href="https://www.gmajormusictheory.org">www.gmajormusictheory.org</a> to reinforce the differences between a major and minor chord.
